Steps Prior To The Lesson

Step 1. Choose an instrument.

Step 2. Select a lesson. Turtle Dance (8 Beats) The Hopscotch Dance (11 Beats) Skunk In The Bathroom (14 Beats) Sailing The Ocean (18 Beats)

(For example: Instrument: "Body Percussion", Lesson: "Turtle Dance")

Step 3. Watch the video.

(You can use your classroom-board as a screen to project video and lesson images on it.)



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














Guided steps: How to play music in a classroom.

Step 1.

Remind students of an important rule: when they play a musical piece, they should: "Start together, stay together and end together!"

Step 2. Each musical piece should start with: "Ready, Set, Go!" (This helps students to establish the steady beat).









Guided steps: How to play a musical piece.

Step 1.

Remind students to sound out each musical movement. For example: "Tap, Clap, Snap, Clap......"

Step 2. Students should be simultaneously doing the movements and sounding them out.

Step 3. Next, the students should play a musical piece with movements only (without the "Tap, Snap, Clap" etc.)

Step 4. Pick an individual student and ask him/her to perform the musical piece.



Lesson Variations

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Variation One. (Part 2.)



Step 1. Ask students to name their favorite musical movements. Write the first letter of the movements on the lines below the beats.

Step 2. Perform the musical piece. Please review page 7–8 above.

Step 3. Count the movements then write the numbers on the lines. (Exercise 2.)







Variation Two (Part 2.)

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This game can have up to 4 players/groups.

Step 1. Inform players that they can use only a specific number of movements for this game. (For example: Turtle Dance has 3 T's, 3 C's and 2 S's in any order.)

Step 2. Invite players one at a time to name their favorite musical movements.

Step 3. Any player who uses more movements than the number allowed is out of the game.

Step 4. After the new musical piece is created, ask all students to play it together.
